Foreword

The Government of Sikkim has accorded highest priority to the education sector by providing an outlay of almost 20% of the State's budget and records have shown that much progress has been achieved, manifesting in remarkable performances by our students who have qualified for IAS, IPS, acquired doctoral and post doctoral degrees and are successfully employed in other parts of the country and abroad. This ratifies the efforts of the State Government in ensuring quality education to the children of the State.

The principal objective of the State Government's education policy is to ensure educational facilities to all children above the age of four years. Quality education has been the key concern and driver to the Government's policies. The devolution of powers to Panchayati Raj Institutions in the management framework has added new dimensions to reforming the existing system of education and its management. The involvement of School Management Committees along with the Panchayati Raj Institutions has given a big boost to the bottoms up approach in planning.

Education per se has numerous indicators where in 'values' is of prime importance. While academic excellence speaks well of the modus operandi, the attitudes and values inculcated in the students speaks volumes about the intangible aspects of education. Our children have been taught to respect women and elders, maintain peace and harmony, show concern for the environment, maintain cleanliness and be of help to the society. Over and above maintaining its position of the most peaceful state, Sikkim today boasts of being the first state in the country to have achieved the 'Nirmal Rajya' status while the cleanliness in towns and cities is another story worth telling.

Governmental interventions have largely tried to address the following core issues aimed to provide accessibility, equity and ensure quality education across all socio economic groups in Sikkim:

- 1. Management of teachers and enhancement of teaching skills
- 2. Decentralisation and management at local levels for better involvement and sustainability i. e. school based management

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- 3. Technological innovations for maintaining latest teaching protocols such as facilitating education with the help of computers
- 4. Financing, supervision and support system for improvement of resources at all levels (both tangible and intangible resources)

As such, the Sarva Shiksha Abhiyan scheme has brought back most of the out of school children back into the school system while incentives like the mid day meal scheme, free uniforms, text books, rain-coat, shoes and socks distribution have helped retain students in the school system. Schemes like the RMSA, being implemented at the secondary level, have added infrastructural support to accommodate a larger number of students in schools. It also has components relating to education of disabled children. The Shakshar Bharat Mission was launched in the State during the financial year 2010-11 to achieve 100% literacy by 2018.

Taking all the above approaches in pursuance to the education policy, various steps have also been taken by the government in the year 2016-17 to especially facilitate the teaching learning process. The Human Resource Development Department on its part has taken up the policies of the government for implementation in the year 2016-17. As such this report is a compilation of activities pertaining to various sections of the department.

CHAPTER 1 SARVA SHIKSHA ABHIYAN (Universal Access to Elementary Education)

There are altogether 1301 schools in the State. Management-wise distribution of these schools is shown in the following Table.

There were 765 schools under HRD Management during 201-16 and during this reporting period 3 Primary Schools were closed due to very low enrolment. 76 schools mentioned under column 2 are commonly known as Monastic Schools, where in addition to traditional 'Lamahood Religious Studies', the monks are also taught English, Mathematics and Environmental Studies. SSA provides textbooks and two primary teachers for teaching these subjects. Monastic Schools are primary level schools as far as teaching level of these modern subjects is concerned. However, there is one Monastic School in North District which has been put under Local Body Management. One school shown under Local Body Management in South District is Jawaharlal Nehru Memorial Institute for Visually Impaired. In this school, salary of teachers is borne by Social Justice, Empowerment and Welfare Department whereas textbooks, uniforms and midday meal are provided by HRD Department.

Out of 19 schools shown in column 4 (Govt. Aided-Pvt), 6 schools are:

- 1. Paljor Namgyal Girls' Sr. Secondary School
- 2. Tashi Namgyal Academy
- 3. Tathangchen Secondary School
- 4. Eklavya Model Residential School, North District
- 5. Eklavya Model Residential School, West District
- 6. Ashram Model Residential School, West District

The remaining 13 schools mentioned under this category are popularly known as 'Sanskrit Pathshalas'.

The Central Government Schools mentioned in column 7 include Kendriya Vidhalayas, Jawaharlal Navodhaya Vidhalayas, Army Schools and Kasturba Gandhi Balika Vidhalaya.

If 77 (76+1) Monastic Schools and 13 Sanskrit Pathshalas are excluded, then the total number of 'regular-formal' schools in the State comes to be 1211, of which 35.7% schools are Private Unaided Schools .

During 2015-16, the enrolment in HRD Department schools at Primary Level was 33,900 and that at Upper Primary Level was 34,690, with the total enrolment at Elementary Level as 68,590. This shows a decrease of 7,730 (12.7%) in enrolment at Elementary Level. Enrolment at Elementary Level under 'All Management Schools' last year was 1,05,297, this shows a fall of 8,907 in enrolment, which in terms of percentage works out to be 8.5. This fall in enrolment is often attributed to the decreasing trend in the child population. Figures in Table 3.4 shows that number of girls at Elementary Level is more than that of boys which indicates that there is no gender bias in the State.

Net Enrolment Ratio (NER)

Table below presents NER at Primary, Upper Primary and Elementary Stage of schooling. NER is defined as the proportion of child population in a specific age group who are enrolled in their age appropriate class.

NER value of 83% at Elementary Level means, for every 100 children in the age group of 6 to 14 years 83 of them are enrolled in classes I to VIII and 17 children are under aged (early admission) and over aged (late admission). Ideally, NER value should be 100%. While calculating NER, enrolment of under-aged and over-aged children are not taken in to account.

As per UDISE 2016-17 figures, there were 2350 under-aged children and 28051 over-aged children at Elementary Stage of schooling. Thus, in total there were 30,401 children who were attending school not in their 'age appropriate' classes.

Textbooks and Uniforms

After the Right of Children to Free and Compulsory Education Act, 2009, came in to force, students are entitled to get textbooks and uniforms free of cost till they complete elementary stage of schooling. SSA provides financial grants to support this scheme of HRD Department at the rate of Rs 150 for primary and Rs 250 for upper primary per student.

Value Education Programme

State Project Office (SSA), in coordination with an NGO, Society for Promotion, Art, Culture and Environment Excellency (SPACE) organized a three days residential workshop on Value Education for the Elementary Level Teachers from 9th to 11th May 2016 in Gangtok. The objectives of the programme were to

- Sensitize the need for value orientation of our system of education among teachers.
- Disseminate the methodology of integrating the cardinal human values with our academic curriculum and pedagogy.
- Work and strive together to evolve a well-structured value-oriented lesson plan pertaining to all the academic discipline taught in schools.
- Aim to adopt one school in each district on pilot-project basis to mould them into full fledged Model Value-Schools to be emulated by other schools.
- Build a strong human resource base consisting of frontline value-education-coaches who would in course of time help in disseminating the concept of good values in every school and academic institution in the State.

The programme was attended by 150 teachers representing 125 schools from all the four districts of the State.

Programme on SHAALA SIDDHI

SHAALA SIDDHI is a programme on School Evaluation for Improvement. The National University of Educational Planning and Administration (NUEPA) is leading the National Programme on School Standards and Evaluation (NPSSE), an initiative that aims at evaluating each school as an institution and creating a culture of self-progression with accountability. NPSSE visualizes School Evaluation as the means and School Improvement as the goal. For this purpose the School Standards and Evaluation Framework (SSEF) has been developed as a comprehensive instrument for school improvement. It enables the school to evaluate its critical performance areas against the well-defined criteria in a focused and strategic manner. The SSEF comprises seven Key Domains as the significant criteria for evaluating performance of schools and each Domain has a set of Core Standards that address the most significant elements of the respective domains.

SSA and RMSA, in collaboration with MHRD, conducted a 3-days programme on SHAALA SIDDHI in the first week of November 2016 for Block Resource Centre Coordinators and some selected Heads of school. The primary objective of this programme was to make the participants familiar with the School Standard and Evaluation Framework and the use of Response Matrix.

PINDICS

PINDICS stands for Performance Indicators for self-evaluation by teachers and for this purpose NCERT has developed PINDICS Format. The format has seven Performance Standards and each Standard has several Performance Indicators. State Project Office, SSA, with the assistance and guidance of SCERT developed a State Specific PINDICS Format in June-July 2016 by inviting suggestions from experienced teachers, heads of schools and administrators. SCERT then conducted one day orientation programme for Block Level Officers on 19th November 2016 to make them aware about the PINDICS Programme.

A total of 1139 elementary school teachers from 99 Junior High Schools and 102 Secondary Schools were involved in this programme. The data collected in the process has been analysed by SCERT and a report on this subject has been prepared.

Community Mobilisation Programme

The Right of Children to Free and Compulsory Education Act 2009 came into force in the State of Sikkim on 11th August 2010. In Part V of the State Rules on this Act, the composition, roles and responsibilities of the School Managing Committee (SMC) has been given. To ensure proper implementation of the State Rules on this subject, State Project Office, in collaboration with District Project Offices and Block Resource Centres, has been regularly organising awareness programmes for members of SMCs. During 2016-17 also several such programmes, copies of various government notifications, circulars, RtE Act and the State RtE Rules were also distributed to the participants. The important areas that were covered during the programmes are as given under.

- 1. RtE Act 2009 and the role of various agencies including SMCs and Local Authorities.
- 2. The concept of Inclusive Education.
- 3. Preparation of School Development Plan.
- 4. Role of SMCs in supporting schools in various activities including classroom practices.

Exposure Visit under Rashtriya Avishkar Abhiyan

Rashtriya Avishkar Abhiyan (RAA) is a programme under SSA envisaged to motivate students in the age group of 6 to 18 years to perform better in Science and Mathematics. As a component of RAA programme, SSA organised an exposure trip for 722 Science and Mathematics toppers of Upper Primary classes with the aim of encouraging these students to perform even better in Science and Mathematics in future. The trip was organised on a batch-wise basis, 3 trips for the students of East and North Districts and 4 trips for the students of South and West Districts. All these trips were conducted from 8th March to 2nd April 2017 and Sikkim Tourism Development Corporation lent support to the whole programme by organizing the entire tour.

A set of CAL System consists of an Interactive White Board, Projector with Ceiling Mount and Desktop Computer. The CPU of the Desktop is connected to the Projector which displays the content of the Desktop to the Interactive Board. The teacher and students can interact through 'touch screen' mode. The main objective of the programme is to promote Maths and Science learning in Upper Primary classes.

Special Training Programme Non-Residential Type (NSTR)

Special Training Programme aims at identifying Out-of-School-Children (OoSC), prepare them for their age appropriate classes and mainstream them into regular schools. For the year 2016-17, 455 OoSC within the age group of 6 to 14 years were identified for this programme. Out of these 455 children, 35 of them were in the age group 6 to 8 years. As per the design of the programme, children within the age 6 to 8 years are directly admitted to their age appropriate classes and therefore number of OoSC in the age range 9 to 14 years for Special Training Programme was 420. However, only 83 of them were available and were ready to undergo this training programme. The district-wise distribution of OoSC has been given in Table 4.6.

Inclusive Education (IE)

Inclusive Education Programme of SSA takes care of education of children with special needs (CWSN). In 2016-17, a total of 1126 CWSN were identified to be covered under IE Programme. Out of these1126 children, 955 children were enrolled in regular schools and the remaining 171 were provided Home-Based-Education (HBE). Category and gender-wise coverage of CWSN under the IE Programme has been presented in table below.

Survey on the status of CCE in Sikkim

HRD Department has been implementing the scheme of Continuous Comprehensive Evaluation (CCE) since the RtE Act 2009 came into force in the State in 2010. All through these years of implementation, we have been receiving a mixed response from teachers, parents and other stakeholders on the impact of CCE. Therefore, a need was felt to conduct a survey to find out the actual status of this scheme of evaluation. Accordingly a survey was carried out and opinion

of teachers on various aspects of CCE was collected through a questionnaire. 1143 teachers participated in this survey. The main objectives of the survey were

- 1. To find out whether teachers are adequately trained to implement CCE in their daily classroom teaching process and also to find out whether the Guidebook prepared by the department is helpful to them.
- 2. To find out whether teachers are using Formative Assessments as expected, and whether they know how it is different from Summative Assessment.
- 3. To find out the reason why teachers still do not fully use activity based learning method.
- 4. To get feedback on assessment of co-scholastic areas.
- 5. To find out whether CCE concepts have helped in reducing drop-out rate and the practice of private tuition.
- 6. To find out whether the present CCE system has helped to achieving the expectation for which it was designed.
- 7. To obtain opinion of teachers on No Detention Policy

The survey was conducted in the month of November 2016 and the report on the findings of the survey was published in February 2017.

Civil Works

- 2 new school buildings which were sanctioned in the financial year 2015-16 but were not completed have now been completed.
- 4 additional classrooms which were sanctioned in 2015-16 and for which a spill over of Rs 30.65 lakhs was sanctioned in 2016-17, the work has now been completed.
- 2 additional classrooms sanctioned in 2016-17 has been constructed and completed on time.
- A spill over of Rs 395.67 lakhs was sanctioned for the construction of normal toilets and Disable Friendly Toilets (DFT). About 55% works under construction of normal toilets has been completed. However, all works related to DFTs has been completed.
- Augmentation facilities for two Block Resource Centres have been provided in West District. Augmentation facilities include construction of a room and provision of necessary furniture and equipment.
- 7625 students have been provided furniture.
- Major and minor repair works in 4 schools have been completed.

Teachers Training Programme

1. Orientation Programme of Key Resource Persons (KRP)

A 3-day orientation programme of KRPs for Block Resource Centre (BRC) Level training of Upper Primary Science and Mathematics Teachers was organized by SCERT on 29th and 30th August 2016. A total of 25 Graduate and Post-Graduate Teachers attended the programme. The prime objective of the programme was to orient KRPs to train teachers teaching science and mathematics at the Block Level. They were also trained to devise learning activities in these subjects.

2. Teachers Training in South District

A short term in-service teachers training was conducted by District Project Office, South District, for teachers teaching in Classes I and II, III to V and VI to VIII as per the following details.

INTEGRATED RASTRIYA MADHYAMIK SHIKSHA ABHIYAN (RMSA)

Integrated Rashtriya Madhyamik Shiksha Abhiyan (RMSA) is comprises of the following four schemes in Sikkim: -

- 1. Rashtriya Madhyamik Shiksha Abhiyan (RMSA)
- 2. Vocationalization of Secondary & Higher Secondary Education
- 3. Information & Communication Technology @ School(ICT)
- 4. Inclusive Education for Disabled at Secondary Stage(IEDSS)

The vision of RMSA is to make good quality education available, accessible and affordable to all young persons in the age group of 14 - 16 duly removing gender, socio-economic and disability barriers.

GOALS OF R.M.S.A.

- Provision of a secondary schools within a reasonable distance of any habitation with a maximum distance of 5 km for expansion of secondary education.
- Ensure GER of 100% by the end of 2017 and a GER 60% by the end of 2012.
- Ensure universal retention by the end of 2020.
- Improvement of the quality of education for all secondary schools. Special emphasis on SC, ST and other minority children.

A. OBJECTIVES OF RMSA

- To ensure provision of physical facilities, staffs and financial support to all secondary schools of Govt/ Local Body and Govt aided schools as per appropriate regulatory mechanism.
- To improve access to secondary schooling to all young persons according to norms through proximate location (Secondary Schools: 5 kms, and Higher Secondary Schools:7-10 kms) / efficient and safe transport arrangements/residential facilities, including open schooling. In hilly and difficult areas, provision of schooling with relaxed norms and preferably through Residential mode.
- To ensure satisfactory quality secondary education and no deprivation due to gender, socio-economic, disability and other barriers.
- To improve quality of secondary education resulting in enhanced intellectual, social and cultural learning.
- Substantial progress in the direction of the Common School System.

A. Short Description/background of the programme.

This scheme was launched in March, 2009 with the objective to enhance access to secondary education and to improve its quality. The implementation of the scheme started from 2009-10. It is envisaged to achieve an enrolment rate of 75% from 52.26% in 2005-06 at secondary stage of implementation of the scheme by providing a secondary school within a reasonable distance of any habitation. The other objectives include improving quality of education imparted at secondary level through making all secondary schools conform to prescribed norms, removing gender, socio-economic and disability barriers, providing universal access to secondary level education by 2017, i.e., by the end of 12th Five Year Plan and achieving universal retention by 2020.

B. Important infrastructure provided under the scheme is:

C. (i) Additional class rooms, (ii) Science Laboratories, (iii) Libraries, (iv) Art and Crafts room, (v)Separate Toilet blocks, (vi) Drinking Water provisions and (vii) Residential Hostels for Teacher (Chujachen).

D. Important quality interventions provided under the scheme are:

- I. Appointment of additional teachers to reduce PTR to 30:1,
- II. Training with Special Focus on Science, Math and English education,
- III. In-service training of teachers,
- IV. ICT enabled education,

- V. Curriculum reforms; and
- VI. Teaching learning reforms.

E. Important equity interventions provided in the scheme are:

(i) Special focus in micro planning (ii) Preference to Ashram schools for Upgradation (iii) Preference to areas with concentration of SC/ST/Minority for opening of new schools (iv) Special enrolment drive for the weaker section (v) More female teachers in schools; and (vi) Separate toilet blocks for girls.

F. Implementation mechanism of the Scheme:

The scheme is being implemented by the State Government societies established for implementation of the scheme. The central share is released to the implementing agency through the state exchequer. The applicable State share is also released to the implementing agency by the respective State Governments.

2. Progress and Achievements made during the year 2016-17.

I. <u>Recurring Component</u>

- A. School Annual Grant was provided to 177 SS and SSS @ 50,000/- per school.
- B. 5 Subject teachers each were provided to 7 upgraded schools.
- C. Project on Art and Culture i.e. Kala Utsav was organized at District levels as well as in State level . The best teams selected under Kala Utsav were sent to Delhi for National level competition. The teams did not win any prizes but they were widely appreciated.



Sherpa, Special Secretary cum SPD, RMSA, Shri Jitendra Singh Raje, Director (Higher Education), Smt Mamta Thapa, Director (Exam & TBU), Shri Bhim Thatal, Director (Primary Education), Dr Rabin Chettri, Director (SCERT), and other officials of the Department. g. Skill Knowledge Providers (SKP) for Vocational Students:

Skill Knowledge sessions was conducted from 12th Oct, 2016 to 25th Nov, 2016 in vocational courses viz. Information Technology and Retail respectively in all the districts of Sikkim. Under NSQF, a skill knowledge provider is required to perform the role and function of providing competency skill based training to the students enrolled in vocational courses. Central Board of Secondary Education (CBSE) has identified Edujobs Academy Pvt. Ltd. as Skill Knowledge Provider for Information Technology and Retail trade. It has corporate office at 8-Moulani Mujibur Rahman Sarani, Kolkata, West Bengal. The main objective of this session was to make students more resourceful and competent in the concerned subjects.

Session was successfully conducted for class-IX, X, XI & XII in schools offering vocational education. The session was helpful and knowledge yielding to students as well as to the faculties was shared. The session focused in practical, theory, demonstration, group task, viva-voce, presentation, interaction and question-answer session to encourage and improve the skills of the students.

h. Skill Assessment and Certification of Vocational Students:

As per the National Skill Qualification Framework (NSQF) and MHRD, Govt. of India guidelines, skills gained by the students enrolled under different vocational trades/subjects have to be assessed by Sector Skills Council of India. After this

assessment, students will get joint certificate from CBSE (Central Board of Secondary Examination) and SSC (Sector Skill Council). The representatives from Sector Skills Council of India assessed the students enrolled under different vocational trades of 121 Government Schools of Sikkim. NASSCOM, a Sector Skill Council of IT/ITeS assess and certify students of Information Technology course, Tourism & Hospitality Skill Council of India (THSC), a Sector Skill Council for Hospitality & Tourism assess the students of Travel & Tourism and Food production course and Retailers Association Skill Council of India, Sector Skill Council for Retail trade assessed the students enrolled in Retail course. Assessment of vocational students of all the four courses was started from 16th November 2016 and continued till 26th December 2016 wherein entire 64 Government Senior Secondary and 57 Secondary Schools of Sikkim were covered.

i. Winter Coaching:

- To improve the pass percentage in the upcoming board exam.





Trade wise details for assessment:

Information Technology

The assessors from Aspiring Minds Pvt. Ltd, Gurgaon under NASSCOM assessed the students of Information Technology course. Total 6358 students from level 1 to level 4 i.e. Class IX to Class XII were assessed in the month of December 2016.

Travel & Tourism and Food Production

Altogether 6355 students of Travel & Tourism and Food Production trade were assessed in the month of December 2016. The Tourism & Hospitality Skill Council (THSC) had assessed the students of Level 1, 2, 3 and 4 under vocational courses.

<u>Retail</u>

For the academic session 2016, the skill assessment of Retail trade was conducted from 3rd December, 2016 to11th December 2016. The students of class IX- XII (Level 1- level 4) were assessed during this session. Total 789 students of Retail trade of 10 Govt. Sr. Sec. and Sec. Schools were assessed by Retailers Associations Skill Council of India, Mumbai.

j. Guest Lecture Session for vocational students:

Guest lecture session was conducted for the students of Class IX, X, XI and XII of all the vocational trades viz. Travel & Tourism, Retail, Food Production and Information Technology to helped students to gain more knowledge in related trades and made them think for a corporate perspective. Guest lecturer delivered lectures on various topics and demonstrated the practical equipments of concerned trade.

Conducting guest lecturers' session for the vocational students by the expects of the respective sector/trade acts as supplementary/provision of new ideas about the world of work in addition to their regular classes, because it offers a new outlook and variety in the way it is taught. It also provides firsthand knowledge required for working in the workplace that is often omitted from a regular class. This brings a better learning experience to the students, the teacher and even the guest speaker. Guest lecture session conducted for vocational students enrolled in level I to IV (class IX to XII) in all treads wherein industry experts and professionals from local industrial estates were hired as guest faculty/ resource person. Resource persons from Travel Agents Association of Sikkim (TAAS), Sikkim United Tourism Organization (SUTO), Sikkim Association of Adventure Tour Operator (SAATO), Sikkim Hoteliers and Restaurant Association (SHRA), Sikkim Amateur



Mountaineering Association (SAMA), home stay operators, hoteliers, travel agency owners, tour operators and other forms of travel trade entrepreneurs were hired for Guest Lecture Sessions for Travel & Tourism students. Resource persons from Reliance Trends, Big Bazaar, local franchisers, wholesalers & retailers were hired for Retail students. 

8. Introduction to ICT Implementation:

The ICT (Information and Communication technology) or named as ICT@Schools scheme has equipped all aspects of advanced technology measures and resources throughout the state. Improvement of learning quality has been synchronized with changing trend of electronic way of learning in education.

ICT@Schools Project's operational segments have been initiated with its phase of application in 13 schools of Sikkim state. ICT scheme has been potentially executed to increase computer literacy as well as knowledge of subject matters in a computerized learning environment.

Government of Sikkim has realized that productive efficiency and higher intellectual capabilities of the learners can only be increased by setting up highly competitive environment. Thus Govt. of Sikkim has ethically set up the operational and structural environment to implement ICT project functionalities to Senior Secondary and Secondary schools throughout the state. Result of implementation has focused upon increasing growth of relevant skills inside of responsible learners evolving career requirements.

This vision has initiated illustration of organizing and documenting every aspect of the project. One side of implementation has emerged functional segmentations as delivery of ICT materials, setting up systematic computerized learning environment and other side has claimed increment of computer related functional knowledge inside student community. ICT has not only emphasized upon usage of

Smart technology like online data management but also managing equity and implementation policies have been engaged with different techniques.

HRDD, Govt. of Sikkim, has provided learning tools and software application guided by RMSA (Rashtriya Madhyamik Shiksha Abhiyan) to the schools. NCERT (National Council of Educational Research and Training) provided ICT syllabus has been used in the schools under the scheme.





IV. IEDSS:

The Scheme of Inclusive Education for Disabled at Secondary Stage (IEDSS) has been launched from the year 2009-10. This Scheme replaces the earlier scheme of Integrated Education for Disabled Children (IEDC) and provides assistance for the inclusive education of the disabled children in classes IX-XII. This scheme has subsumed under Rashtriya Madhyamik Shiksha Abhiyan (RMSA).

Aims

To enabled all students with disabilities, to pursue further four years of secondary schooling after completing eight years of elementary schooling in an inclusive and enabling environment.

Objectives

The scheme covers all children studying at the secondary stage in Government, local body and Government-aided schools, with one or more disabilities as defined under the Persons with

Disabilities Act (1995) and the National Trust Act (1999) in the class IX to XII, namely blindness, low vision, leprosy cured, hearing impairment, locomotory disabilities, mental retardation, mental illness, autism, and cerebral palsy and may eventually cover speech impairment, learning disabilities, etc. Girls with the disabilities receive special focus to help them gain access to secondary schools, as also to information and guidance for developing their potential. Setting up of Model inclusive schools in every State is envisaged under the scheme.

Components

- Student-oriented components, such as medical and educational assessment, books and stationery, uniforms, transport allowance, reader allowance, stipend for girls, support services, assistive devices, boarding the lodging facility, therapeutic services, teaching learning materials, etc.
- Other components include appointment of special education teachers, allowances for general teachers for teaching such children, teacher training, orientation of school administrators, establishment of resource room, providing barrier free environment, etc.

with Disabilities Act (1995) and the National Trust Act (1999). The type of disabilities range from blindness, low vision, leprosy cured, hearing impairment, locomotor disability, mental retardation, mental illness, autism and cerebral leprosy, speech impairment, learning disabilities etc. Girls with disabilities are provided with special attention to help them gain access to secondary education, information and guidance for their developing potential. Moreover, the scheme envisages to set up model inclusive schools in every state.

1. Progress and Achievements made during the year 2016-17.

o <u>Recurring Component</u>

- Environment Building Program was conducted at district level
- Orientation programme for Parents, Administrators, principals etc has been conducted for CWSNs.
- Districtwise Identification and Assessment Camp was conducted in convergence with Social Justice and Welfare Department
- Various assistive devices and teaching-learning materials were distributed to eight blind children under secondary and senior secondary level
- Distribution of escort allowances to physically impaired children, blind children, children with cerebral palsy, children with multiple disability and mental retardation children.
- Procurement of Braille Book for blind children of secondary level has been done through text book sections.
- Appointment of 2 new Special educators was done in addition to 3 existing Special Educators.

CHAPTER 3 SCHOLARSHIP & EXAMS

The Scholarship Section of Human Resource Development Department undertakes the implementation of scholarship schemes of both the State and Central Government. The schemes implemented by the Scholarship Section, HRDD are as under:

STATE GOVERNMENT SPONSORED SCHEMES.

1. Hon'ble Chief Minister's Merit Scholarship Scheme (HCMMSS).

The State Government of Sikkim has launched the Hon'ble Chief Minister's Merit Scholarship Scheme from the year 2010. This scheme aims to provide *free education* to talented and deserving children from underprivileged family background with an opportunity to study in reputed private schools both within and outside the State.

Screening test of Class V topper students to avail HCMMSS for the academic session 2016-17 was conducted at all the Districts on 26th December, 2016. Total of 50 students (27 boys and 23 girls) were selected under the existing reservation policy and admitted to various schools, forty (40) within Sikkim and ten(10)outside Sikkim. Till date 819 students (346 boys and 473 girls) have been benefitted under the scheme.

EXTENSION OF HCMMS SCHEME UP TO GRADUATION LEVEL

With a view to provide consistent Government support to the students under HCMMSS, to enable them to continue with their higher studies, the State Government has extended the said scheme up to the graduation level vide Notification No1136/Exam/HRDD dated 28th March 2017. The first batch of 44 students have passed out Class XII Board Examination and are eligible to take admission in various colleges for their under graduate courses for the academic Session 2017-18.

2. Cash Award for local student toppers in CBSE 2016-17.

In order to motivate the student to excel in their studies, the Hon'ble Chief Minister has made announcement of incentives in the form of cash award in the following categories of students who are toppers in CBSE Examination vide Notification No. 503/DIR/HRDD/SE dated 18.09.2012.

(i). Class XII CBSE: 1st, 2nd and 3rd State Toppers are given cash award @ Rs. 50,000/-, Rs. 35,000/- and Rs. 25,000/- respectively in Science, Arts, Commerce and Vocational Stream.

3. Merit and Prerna Scholarship Scheme for School Education.

(a). Class V Open Competitive Examination for Merit Scholarship was held on 25th February 2017 in the 9 Sub-divisions of the State. Six students, three on merit and three from amongst the girls for Prerna Scholarship were selected from each sub-division for the award of scholarship. A total of 54 meritorious students were selected for aforesaid scholarship at the Elementary Level.

- (i) For Merit Scholarship, 1st, 2nd and 3rd position were awarded @ Rs. 1200/-, Rs. 1000/- and Rs. 800/- per annum respectively in Classes VI, VII and VIII.
- (ii) For Prerna Scholarship, 1st, 2nd and 3rd position were awarded @ Rs. 800/-, Rs. 700/and Rs. 600/- per annum respectively in Classes VI, VII and VIII.

(b). At the Secondary Level, Merit Scholarship was awarded to students who secured 1st, 2nd and 3rd position at the District Level in Class VIII Annual Examination. Based on the merit list, the next three girl students were selected for Prerna Scholarship at the District Level. A total of 24 meritorious students were selected for aforesaid scholarship at the Secondary Level.

- (i) For Merit Scholarship, 1st, 2nd and 3rd position were awarded @ Rs. 1500/-, Rs.
 1200/- and Rs. 900/- per annum respectively in Classes IX and X.
- (ii). For Prerna Scholarship, 1st, 2nd and 3rd position were awarded @ Rs. 900/-, Rs. 800/- and Rs. 700/- per annum respectively in Classes IX and X.

The Merit and Prerna scholarship for the academic session 2014-15 and 2015-16 has been released to the respective District Joint Directors (HRDD) for disbursement to the beneficiaries. The proposal to obtain administrative approval and sanction of fund for the academic session 2016-17 is in process.

4. <u>Post Matric Scholarship</u>.

The Post Matric Scholarship is granted to all local students under merit and general categories pursuing various courses within and outside the state.

(a). MERIT SCHOLARSHIP:

Scholarship ranging from Rs.800/- to Rs.2,000/- p.m. is awarded to students who secure 70% and above in Class XII Board Examination or equivalent. The percentage is calculated from the scores of English and three main subjects. Further, annual reimbursement of maximum Rs.10,000/- is also awarded for some courses viz. MBBS/BDS, B. Tech/ B. Arch and some notified honors at graduation level.

(b). <u>GENERAL SCHOLARSHIP</u>:

All local students securing less than 70% but more than 50% (45% for ST/SC) are granted scholarship in selected courses as notified by the Department on submission of valid income certificate of Rs.10,000/- per annum or less for both parents. Further, annual reimbursement of maximum Rs.10,000/- is also awarded for some courses viz; MBBS/BDS, B. Tech/ B. Arch and some notified honors at graduation level.

(c). <u>FELLOWSHIP FOR M.PHIL & PHD SCHOLARS</u>:

Scholarship is awarded for pursuing Ph. D courses @ Rs.6,000/- p.m. for regular candidates with subject related to the State of Sikkim with a contingency grant of

Rs.15,000/- per annum for a maximum period of three years and Rs. 3,000/- p.m. for in-service candidates with reimbursement of Rs. 12,000/- per annum.

The Government has sanctioned a fund of Rs. 1 crore for payment of Scholarship. This amount is being released to the beneficiaries of academic session 2013-14. The disbursement of post matric scholarship payment is made through Direct Bank Transfer (DBT) to the beneficiaries bank account seeded with Aadhaar.

5. <u>Grant of Financial Assistance to Local Students admitted to Rashtriya</u> Indian Military College (RIMC), Dehradun.

The scholarship section also grants the financial assistance to the local students studying in Rashtriya Indian Military College, Dehradun at the rate of Rs. 20,000 /- per annum per student. The candidates have to qualify in the entrance exams conducted by the Home Department for the said Institute. The said exam is conducted twice in a year in the month of June and December.

A total of 9 cadets have benefitted under this scheme. At present, three students are studying in RIMC, Dehradun, the detail of which is given in the following table. The payment of scholarship for these three cadets for the academic session 2016-17 has been released.

7. <u>Scholarship for Schedule Tribe girl students in Banasthali University,</u> <u>Rajasthan</u>.

Every year two Girls students belonging to Scheduled Tribe category of nine to ten years age group are selected and sponsored free education (including tuition hostel and transportation fees) up to Ph.D. level in Hindi language at the Banasthali University, Rajasthan. A total of thirteen sikkimese students are studying in this University.

8. <u>Admission of Meritorious Girl Students passing Class IV to Him Jyoti</u> <u>School, Dehradun.</u>

The scheme of admitting two Meritorious under privilege Girl Students passing Class IV to Him Jyoti School, Dehradun was started from the year 2008. Under the scheme, the selected Girls are entitled *Free Education* from Class V to XII. Till date 20 Students have benefited under the scheme.

9. <u>Grant of Financial Assistance to Local BPL Students admitted to</u> <u>Government Colleges in the State</u>.

Financial assistance at the rate of Rs. 300/- p.m. is awarded to local students under BPL category studying in Government Colleges in the State. However, for the past many years there has been no applicant under the said scheme.

10. <u>Reimbursement of tuition fees to students in Destitute Homes of Sikkim.</u>

The local students living in various Destitute Homes of Sikkim (Atish Dipankar Destitute Home, Chakung and Kaluk Destitute Home) can claim for reimbursement of the school tuition fees from the Scholarship Section, HRDD, Government of Sikkim. However, for the past many years there has been no applicant under the said scheme.

(B) CENTRAL GOVERNMENT SPONSORED SCHEMES.

11. National Talent Search Examination (NTSE).

The purpose of the scheme is to identify talented students and nurture them. NTSE is meant for students studying in class X. There will be two stage selection process for award of scholarship, Stage I at the state level and stage II at the national level. The students who qualify stage I will be eligible to appear in stage II examination conducted by NCERT. On the basis of stage I examination, every year 25 students are selected for stage II. Till date no students have qualified in stage II at National level under the scheme. The selected students receive the scholarship from class XI up to PhD studies.

12. National Means cum Merit Scholarship Scheme (NMMSS).

The centrally sponsored scheme National Means cum Merit Scholarship Scheme (NMMSS) was launched in May 2008. The objective of the scheme is to award scholarship to meritorious students of economically weaker sections to arrest their drop out at class VIII and encourage them to continue the study at secondary stage. Scholarship of Rs. 6000/per annum (Rs. 500/-per month) per student is awarded to selected students every year to study in classes from IX to XII in State Government ,Government aided and local body schools. The student whose parental income from all sources is not more than Rs. 1,50,000/- per annum are eligible to avail the scholarship. There is reservation as per State Government norms. The students are selected for this scholarship through an examination conducted by Human Resource Development Department, Government of Sikkim. Scholarships are disbursed by the State bank of India directly into the Bank accounts (DBT) of students in quarterly basis.

The selection test for NTS and NMMS was conducted on 6th Novermebr, 2016. Fifty six students (as per roster) from Sikkim were selected for the NMMS.

13. National Foundation for Teachers' Welfare (NFTW).

The ministry of Human Resource Development, Government of India has a scheme under National Foundation for Teachers' Welfare (NFTW) for award of Financial Assistance to School Teachers under the Scheme of "Support for Professional Education of Children of School Teachers" to maximum of Rs. 15,000/- per candidate per year. The financial assistance is granted to one ward of the school teacher for pursuing certain identified professional courses in the field of engineering, Medical, Management and Technical Education.

In Sikkim this scheme was implemented from the year 2005-06 onwards. To avail the scheme uninterruptedly, an annual contribution of Rs. 1,00,000/- (Rupees one lakhs) has to be contributed towards the corpus of the Foundation by the State Working Committee.

In 2016, a total of 29 applications received from the teachers were submitted to MHRD, out of which only eight applications were accepted and sanction was made for payments of Rs. 15,000/-to each candidate.

14. <u>National Scheme of Incentive to Girls for Secondary Education.</u> (NSIGSE).

The objective of the schemes is to reduce the drop-outs and to promote the enrolment of ST and SC girl children in secondary schools. According to the scheme, a sum of Rs.3,000/- is deposited in the name of eligible girls as fixed deposit on enrolment in class IX, and are entitled to withdraw the sum along with interest after passing Class X and attaining 18 years of age. The scheme covers (i) all girls belonging to SC/ST communities who pass class VIII and (ii) all girls who pass VIII examination from Kasturba Gandhi Balika Vidyalayas (irrespective of whether they belong to SC/ST) and enroll in class IX in State Government, Government-aided and Local Body schools. To be eligible for the benefit under the scheme the girl should be unmarried and should be below 16 years of age (as on 31st March) on joining class IX.

15. North East Council (NEC).

HRD Department has been extending financial support to the students pursuing higher education in professional courses under "Stipend and Book Grant" from NEC Shillong. The North East Council has been rendering financial assistant in the form of stipend and book grant to the students of North East States through the State Government including Sikkim since 2006. The assistance is given for Diploma, Degree, Post Graduation, M. Phil and Ph. D. courses. . A fund of Rs. 60.50 lakhs (State share of Rs. 2.11 lakhs against centre share of Rs. 58.39 lakhs)has been received for the scheme during 2015-16. Accordingly, the scholarship is being released to 904 candidates including fresh (474) and renewal (430)from the session 2010 to 2015.

CHAPTER 4 DISTRIBUTION OF TEXTBOOK & UNIFORMS

State Government has introduced some beneficiary schemes for enhancing enrolment at Primary & Elementary Stage so as to fulfill the national commitment of Universalisation of Elementary Education (UEE). To achieve the goal of Compulsory Elementary Education and to provide quality education in the State, the Government has introduced many beneficiary schemes. In this endeavor, the Textbook Section of H.R.D. Department, Government of Sikkim has been implementing various schemes for the students of Sikkim which are mentioned as follows:

School Uniforms:

Annually distributed items like- Pant, Shirt, Skirts, Tunic & Bakhu Set to the students of Government Schools from Classes Pre-Primary/ LKG/ UKG to VIII free of cost was completed before reopening of schools for the new academic session.

Exercise Books:

Exercise Books are also distributed free of cost to the students from Classes Pre-Primary/LKG/UKG to VIII of all Government Schools.

Textbooks:

Free textbooks are distributed to the students of Classes Pre-Primary, LKG, UKG to V up to 2009 and from 2010 onwards Primary/LKG/UKG to Class VIII of all the Government Schools and at 50% concessional rate from Class IX to XII procuring from NCERT & CBSE, Delhi making full payment in advance every year.

Shoes & Socks:

One pair of shoes and two pairs of socks are distributed free cost to the students from Classes I to V of all the Government Schools and Classes VI to VIII of notified Government Schools located at remote areas from the Academic Aession-2008 onwards.

Introduction of Term Books From Classes I To V:

All the subjects are compiled in one book named as Term Book prepared by SCERT, Govt. of Sikkim consequently the students are made free from carrying bag load of books.

School Stationeries:

Teacher's Attendance register, Visitors book, Student's attendance register, Teacher's Dairy, Transfer & Character Certificate, etc. to all Government Schools are/ were provided to all Government schools at the beginning of the academic session.

Syllabi:

The Syllabi for Classes LKG, UKG, I to VIII are prepared by SCERT, HRDD, Government of Sikkim and for Classes IX to XII syllabi is based on CBSE Board, New Delhi. Apart from these, Whatsapp group of officials of textbook unit and In-charges of warehouses (Textbook) of four districts and concerned Head of Institutions has been created to disseminate information regarding textbooks, uniform, NCERT & CBSE books, etc.

Under the banner of HRDD official website, the Textbook Unit has a proposal of creating a Blog on the internet that would make everyone aware of books, syllabi and curriculum used/ followed by the Government Schools of Sikkim.

CHAPTER 5 MID DAY MEAL

National Programme for Nutritional support to Primary Education Mid-Day Meal Scheme was launched as a Centrally Sponsored Scheme on 15th August, 1995 in a phased manner all over India. Its objective was to boost "Universalisation of Primary Education by increasing enrolment, retention, attendance and simultaneously impacting on nutrition of students in primary classes". The programme originally covered children of primary level (classes I to V) in government, local body and government aided schools. In October 2002, the programme was extended to cover children studying in Education Guarantee Scheme (EGS) & AIE centers and from the same year the hot cooked meal was started in the State of Sikkim. Prior to the year 2001-02 the food grain (Rice) provided by the Government of India @3kgs per child per month for 10 academic months in a year, was distributed as dry rations to the children. However, the Supreme Court in its order dated: 28.11.2001 in WP(C) NO. 196 of 2001- People's Union for Civil Liberties versus Union of India and other, directed all the state governments to provide cooked Mid-Day-Meal containing 300 calories and 8 to 10 grams of protein per serving.

Cooked Mid-Day-Meal is served to school children of Sikkim up-to Primary level (class I-V) from 2002 and from class (VI-VIII) are being provided from the academic session 2008, Though GOI norms don't cover the children of Pre-Primary classes for hot cooked meal but Sikkim has unique system of such pre-primary classes in all the Schools, these children were given hot cooked meal till the end of academic session of 2009 without any discrimination by the SMC of the respective schools.

Sikkim state has not come across with any major interruption except a few cases of slight delay in reaching the food grains during monsoon sessions because of blockage of roads, however, with a view to mitigate such problems the Heads of Schools are advised to keep buffer stock of food grains during such period.

OBJECTIVES:

The main aims and goal of the MDM Scheme in schools is to stop drop outs from schools.

Provide hot meal in the schools so that the students can pay attention to their education.

Develop healthy body by providing nutritious food.

MDM shall stop gender disparities, social barriers.

TRANSFER OF FUND

From the academic year 2014 the funds under Mid-Day Meal Scheme has been transferred to mdm accounts of respective schools after obtaining en-bloc sanction of the Government of Sikkim. Thereafter, during 2015-16 the HRDD has obtained the approval of Green Channel wherein, funds under Mid Day Meal Scheme can be transferred in the account of schools head within no time.

AWARNESS PROGRAMME OF MDM SCHEME AT DISTRICT LEVEL:

wareness Programme to stake holders, heads of schools, cook cum helpers under Mid-Day-Meal Scheme are being conducted at all the four district by the Resource persons and nutritional experts attended by the district authority and officials from the department to sensitize the heads of the schools pertaining to entitlement under MDM, accountability, transparency, participation of stake holders and smooth functioning.

HANDBOOK OF MID-DAY MEAL SCHEME

Handbook of Mid-Day Meal Scheme introduced by the State Project Office, MDM, Cell, HRDD containing all the Circulars, Guidelines, Formats and details of schools, complexes, BACs, etc has been distributed to all the schools/ stake holders.

- 3. All schools entry their daily mid-day meal availed in the state designed web portal to generate e-bill and information on real time basis.
- 4. Sensitization of school heads/SMC/Cooking agencies about the latest development of MDM.
- 5. Many schools are maintaining kitchen garden and poly-house to provide organic/fresh mid day meal from their own kitchen garden.

CHAPTER 6

DISTRICT INSTITUTE OF EDUCATION AND TRAINING (DIET) & DISTRICT RESOURCE CENTRE

The State of Sikkim has three Government Teacher Education Institutions to conduct preservice 2-year Diploma in Elementary Education (D.El.Ed.) programme. They are DIET, East, Gangtok, DIET, South, Namchi & DIET, West, Geyzing.

These institutions are 90:10 Centrally Sponsored Scheme under Teacher Education from the Financial Year 2012-2013, receiving grants from Ministry of Human Resource Development Department (MHRD), Government of India, New Delhi.

Faculty and Ministerial Staff:

DIET, Gangtok has 20 faculty including Principal and 18 Ministerial staff. In addition to this we have 3 part time faculty for 3 local languages i.e., Bhutia, Lepcha & Limboo. Faculty of DIET, Gangtok are non-vacation as they have to conduct short term in-service Training Programmes/workshops to different clientele of school teachers especially at primary level during vacations.

For your kind information, 2 faculty members are on study leave to pursue M.Ed. Degree for 2 years at Harka Maya College, Tadong, Gangtok. They will be completing the course in the month of July, 2017.

Curriculum

As regard to Curriculum, the Institute follows NCTE curriculum with little modification based on the need and demand of the state. The curriculum and the syllabus from the Academic session 2016 have been revised as per the RTE Act 2009 and NCF for Teacher Education 2009 by taking the reference of curriculum developed by NCTE in collaboration with SCERT & Ajim Premji.

Curriculum of D.El.Ed programme includes Child studies, Education & Contemporary Studies, Curriculum & Pedagogy Studies, Practice Teaching and School Internship Programme and other value added courses for holistic development.

Hindi Language Awareness Programme:

Besides, Central Institute of Hindi (CIH), Agra organizes Hindi Language Awareness Programme in two phases. First phase at the Institute for about 20 days in the month of April and in the 2nd phase, student teachers will be called to CIH, Agra for advance course with same duration during winter vacation. This programme is 100% sponsored by the CIH, Agra. However, the CIH, Agra did not invite the student teachers this year (January 2017) on account of the renovation work of the institute.

Functions of DIET.

- 1. Conducts 2-year Pre Service Diploma in Elementary Education (D.El.Ed) course.
- 2. Conducts Short Term need based In-Service Trainings & Workshops to H.Ms & Primary Teachers at Primary Level.
- 3. Conducts Orientation programmes for other functionaries working for teacher education e.g., BRCCs, CRCCs, Aaganwadi workers, etc.
- 4. Monitors and supervises educational institutions in their jurisdiction.
- 5. Extends support for professional development of teacher educators.
- 6. Develops locally relevant Teaching Learning Materials (TLM), evaluation tools etc.
- 7. Develops Training Modules, Curriculum and syllabus for in-service teacher training.
- 8. Extend support in writing text books, moderation & evaluation of Questions at different levels.

2-year Diploma in Elementary Education (D.El.Ed).

The intake capacity of pre-service 2-year D.El.Ed. course is 50 per annum as per the NCTE norm.



CHAPTER 7 STATE COUNCIL OF EDUCATIONAL RESEARCH AND TRAINING (SCERT)

Text Book, Curriculum Development and Publication

Review of School Term Books

State Council of Educational Research and Training (SCERT) - Sikkim has been developing text books for the government schools of Sikkim since 1983 for classes I to V. English Text books for classes VI to VIII have been developed since 1993. The government schools of Sikkim use text-books published by National Council of Educational Research and Training (NCERT) for other subjects for classes VI to XII. Since its first publication the state designed textbooks have been revised and modified by SCERT



as and when needed. However, for publication of new edition of these Term Books, the text book development committee comprising of faculty members from SCERT and District Institute of Education and Training(DIET)-East reviewed and did minor modifications during October – January 2016 (Term I) and during November - January 2016 (Term II). English text books for classes VI to VIII was also edited and reviewed during November – December 2016 by the English department of SCERT.

Review of work-sheets for Pre Primary Classes

Human Resource Development Department (HRDD) has introduced Lower Kindergarten (LKG) and Upper Kindergarten (UKG) in the government schools of Sikkim from academic session 2016. Based on age and developmentally appropriate Early Childhood Education (ECE) curriculum framework, worksheets were developed by selected faculty members from SCERT and DIET in 2015.



Three sets of worksheets each for LKG and UKG developed during 2015 were edited and reviewed during October – December 2016 by the team from SCERT and DIET. The same are being used by the schools for academic session 2017-18.

Lesson Diary for Teachers of Government Schools

At the beginning of new academic session of 2017, SCERT took the initiative of reviewing and redesigning the existing teachers' diary. SCERT officials and faculty members, after several rounds of discussions and deliberation, redesigned the diary thereby removing some of the components of the existing diary and incorporating necessary materials, tools and other essential documents. Some of the new components that have been added in the newly designed *Teachers' Companion* are teaching skills, development of life skills in students, tools for assessing co- scholastic areas, consolidated format for recording performance in scholastic areas, training needs, suggestions for professional development and list of important education related websites with their contact details.

Teachers' Companion has been carefully designed with the prime objective of empowering teachers to discharge the diverse responsibilities entrusted on them, effectively and systematically. The exercise of redesigning the teachers' companion was co-ordinated by Deputy Director of SCERT Dr Shanti Ram Adhikari.

Development of materials on Organic Farming for NCERT text-books

In the suggestion of Hon'ble Minister, HRDD, Govt of Sikkim, Shri R.B. Subba NCERT in its Governing Council Meeting took a resolution to include chapters on Organic Farming in textbooks published by them. Consequently a group of resource persons was constituted by NCERT.

SCERT-Sikkim was a leading partner in the said group constituted by NCERT. The group worked together to develop chapters on organic farming, which will be included in the text books of classes VI to VIII. Besides members from SCERT-Sikkim, others experts in the group were from Department of Agriculture of Indira Gandhi National Open University (IGNOU) New Delhi, scientists from Indian Agricultural Research Institute (IARI) New Delhi, Progressive Farmer from Uttar Pradesh, Centre for Technology and Development, Delhi and others.

The group developed materials on organic farming with the following objectives-

- To encourage eco-friendly organic farming practices in school education for healthy environment in modern day agriculture.
- To inculcate the principle and concepts of organic farming among the elementary level students.

Nominated faculty members from SCERT-Sikkim attended several workshops organized for the above mentioned purpose and contributed towards writing three chapters on - Contribution of Sikkim in developing concept of organic farming and the success stories of farmers from Sikkim.

Study Materials for D.El.Ed. Curriculum

The curriculum for Diploma in Elementary Education (D.El.Ed) was modified as per the December-2014 regulations of National Council of Teacher Education (NCTE) by SCERT and DIETs in collaboration with Ajim Premji University, Bengaluru in 2015-16.

During 2016-17, SCERT decided to prepare reading materials for each subject included in the new curriculum. For this, a group comprising of faculty members from all DIETs and lead by SCERT faculty members – Ms Anjali Rasaily and Ms Ranju Pradhan, was formed. The group was entrusted with the task of preparing the study materials with support from Ajim Premji University, Bengaluru. The final draft of the materials are being examined by experts of Azim Premji University and coordinator of the project Ms Malati Rai of SCERT, which will be printed in near future for the use of DIETs and TTIs of the state.

Development of Reading materials for Learning Enhancement Program (LEP)

SCERT being the Pedagogy Cell of SSA in Sikkim had already prepared reading materials for Classes I and II in 2013-14. The materials are being used in Govt Schools for Early Literacy Program(ELP) of SSA in the state.

From beginning of 2016, similar materials for Classes III to V have been developed by SCERT with support from faculty members of DIET (East) and some school teachers. The manuscripts of the same for all subjects – English, Mathematics, EVS and Nepali have been submitted to State Project Office (SPO)-SSA on December-2016 for their publication. These books will be used for Learning Enhancement Program of SSA in the state.

Programs for Professional Development of Teachers, Teacher Educators and Block and Cluster Resource Center Coordinators (BRCs & CRCs)

SCERT regularly conducts various academic programmes and activities for professional development of in-service teachers and teacher educators of the state. Subject specific training programmes are organised on regular basis for in-service teachers teaching at different levels. Key resource persons (KRPs) are also prepared from amongst teachers of government schools who will take the responsibility of conducting training at the district and block level.

From the financial year 2016-17, SCERT has also started organizing programs for BRC and CRC coordinators.

In addition to capacity building training and workshop programs, SCERT also conducted a self assessment program for teachers called PINDICS for the professional development of the

teachers. The tool developed for this purpose by NCERT was contextualized for the state of Sikkim and was administered through BRC coordinators.

Programs conducted to prepare KRPs and MRPs of the state

During 2016-17, SCERT conducted four programs for training KRPs in various subjects in which 162 KRPS were trained. The details of these programs conducted by SCERT to prepare KRPs is given below-

A questionnaire was developed to collect data from the participants on various aspects of functioning of the respective BRCs and CRCs. The tool was administered during the programme mentioned above. The main objective was to understand their role in the state of Sikkim and enable them to work toward improving the quality of education in government schools in the state.

A comprehensive report was prepared by Dr Genevive Syangbo and was submitted to HRDD. Based on the report, SPO - SSA in consultation with SCERT had proposed to appoint Resource Persons (RP) in four subjects for each BRC and the proposal has already been approved by the State Government. Further necessary action is being taken by SPO – SSA.

Performance Indicators (PINDICS) for Elementary School Teachers of Junior High Schools and Secondary Schools

Teacher self-assessment is a mechanism for enabling professional growth of the teacher. It is an efficient technique for higher achievement and enhancing performance of the teachers. In this context Performance Indicators (PINDICS) developed by NCERT is a form of self-assessment which highlights teacher efficacy and efforts in their teaching practices.

SPO-SSA in consultation with SCERT conducted a program of contextualizing the said PINDICS for the state of Sikkim and administered the contextualized version to 1139 elementary school teachers in the category of Primary (PRT), Graduate Teacher Arts and Graduate Teacher Science. The latter also included mathematics teachers. A total of 99 Junior High School (JHS) and 102 secondary schools (SS) were selected from all the four districts of the state. All 31 BRCs were engaged in the process of administering the tool. One day orientation program was organized by SCERT to orient the BRC members to make them understand the guidelines and instructions on 19th of November 2016.

Two Day National Conference on Quality Education in the Present Educational Scenario

Since last year SCERT has been conducting educational research in the state. This year North East Regional Institute of Education (NERIE), Umiam Meghalaya invited three SCERT faculty members - Mr Rajiv Philip, Dr Genevive Syangbo and Dr Pema Subba to present their research papers in "A two day National Conference on Quality Education in the Present Educational Scenario" held on 23rd and 24th February 2017.



During the conference the organizers shared that out of 392 applicants from all over the country only 92 papers were shortlisted for the conference. Out of the 92 papers four papers were from SCERT – Sikkim. Mr Rajiv Philip delivered his presentation on "Analysis of Quality Monitoring Tools to identify Training Needs and Learner Assessment in Sikkim". Dr Genevive presented a paper on "Role of BRCs and CRCs in Augmenting Quality Education in Sikkim", Dr Pema articulated on "Understanding Status of Art Education in the Government Senior Secondary Schools of East Sikkim" and yet another research paper on "Self-Assessment of Teachers: A Tool for Enhancing Performance" prepared by Dr Rabin Chhetri, Mr Paritosh Pathak, Mr Rajiv Philip, Dr Genevive Syangbo and Dr Pema Subba was also presented jointly by them.

On- Site Support to Other Institutions and Schools of the State

SCERT-Sikkim has started "On -site support" program for supporting other institutions and schools of Sikkim to support their academic growth. During the year 2016-17, many officials and faculty members from SCERT visited DIETs and schools to understand their need and organized training programs in the visited Institutes' campus. A brief report is given below.

6.1 Visit and Orientation of District DIETs

Dr Rabin Chhetri- Director SCERT accompanied by Dr Shanti Ram Adhikari -Deputy Director and Dr Pema Subba- Faculty visited DIET Namchi on 3rd October 2016 and DIET Geyzing on 4th October 2016.

It was basically a non-formal gathering where SCERT team shared the roles, responsibilities and expectations of DIET. It was an interactive session with the active participation of the Principal and the faculty members of the institutes. The emphasis was laid on what they needed to do besides their usual routine of teaching the pre-service D.El.Ed course. They were apprised with several pertinent areas which would not only lead to their professional growth but their role in bringing about quality education.

Details of the outreach training programme started by SCERT called **"On-Site Support to Schools"** was presented in the session. Members of DIETs were familiarized with their role in such programs in which teachers would be oriented on their campus itself on areas like teaching skills, preparation of blue print of question paper, assessment, constructivist approach to teaching, NCF-2005 etc. School monitoring was another area which was discussed. Such programs, to name a few, would include preparation of tools to capture profile of school –

inclusive of teachers, students, etc. visit classrooms during teaching period, identify problems and good practices, document good practices, prepare strategy to solve problem and document change in each school.

Action Research is one of the very important tools which every teacher educator should take up and was discussed at length. Emphasis was laid on the need to undertake educational research which would help them to study the different aspects of education.

The principal and faculty were also apprised on the importance of Experimental School. Under this programme a single school preferably a primary school could be adopted by DIET. The objective would be to design support programs for the school's holistic development.

Emphasis was also given to develop Diet as District Resource Centre. This would include academic support to BRCs and CRCs, develop laboratory for designing materials for children with special needs (CWSN), well-stocked library, design Teaching Learning Materials (TLMs) etc.

6.2 Workshop for preparing research tools and report writing in DIET West

In continuation of the support and for further capacity building of faculty members of DIET – West a two day workshop was organized by SCERT on 30th and 31st March 2017 at DIET –Geyzing. Interactive sessions were held on preparation of research tools and report writing for the action research and short-term research they have taken up.



SCERT Extending On- Site Academic Support to Schools

Deviating from the conventional method of calling teachers to SCERT for training, SCERT has started a new initiative of "Onsite Support". This is an outreach training programme, which would provide onsite training to teachers of all subjects and all level in selected JHS of four districts. The school faculty will be trained on their campus itself on areas like teaching skills, preparation of blue print and question paper, methods and tools of formative assessment, constructivist approach to teaching, NCF-2005 etc. The selection of JHS for this programme has been done on the basis of Quality Monitoring Tool (QMT) analysis undertaken by Mr. Rajiv Philip from SCERT.

Academic support of SCERT during Evaluation, Examination and Recruitment process conducted by different sections of HRDD

SCERT is also entrusted to take up the academic part of the works which are undertaken by other sections of HRDD. As in the past years, during 2016-17 also, SCERT did its part of assigned job when Directorate of Examination & Scholarship and Teacher Recruitment Board (TRB) conducted several examinations – STET (August 2016 and February 2017), Hon'ble Chief Minister's Merit Scholarship (HCMMS) Examination (December 2016), National Talent Search Examination (NTSE) (September 2016). It also supported to conduct final examination and entrance examination of D.El.Ed. course conducted by DIETs (June- 2016). SCERT also provided support during the time of interview for teachers of Tashi Namgyal Academy and teacher educators for B.Ed College, Soreng.

Besides these routine annual programmes, SCERT being the academic authority of the state was also invited by Director Ms Mamta Thapa – Examination and Scholarship section HRDD to discuss about the remodelled pattern of evaluation framed by Central Board of Secondary Education (CBSE). SCERT was represented by Director- Dr Rabin Chhetri, Joint Director - Ms Surki Bhutia, and Deputy Director – Dr Shanti Ram Adhikari. Joint Directors of various sections like Exams and Scholarship, Textbooks, Primary Education were also present. It was also attended by Mr G B Nirola, retired Joint Director of HRDD and now the consultant of SSA. Dr Shanti Ram Adhikari gave a presentation on the remodeled pattern of evaluation proposed by CBSE for classes IX and X which was followed by discussion. After a detail discussion it was decided that the new pattern of evaluation will be implemented in classes IX and X from 2017-18 academic session and in classes VI-VIII from 2018-19 academic session. Further, it was also decided to have a small workshop immediately involving heads of schools in and around Gangtok to discuss and decide about the format of implementation of the new evaluation pattern in classes.

Sri Satya Sai Vidya Vahini: Value- Based Integrated Education

Sri Satya Sai Vidya Vahini (SSSVV) is a practical framework to implement integral Education by providing teachers with the content, training, technology, infrastructure and teaching/learning aids. Shifting them from rote learning towards more insightful, inspiring, enjoyable and active participation of schools to expand their domains of influence from classroom to corridor, campus and community has been envisaged in this project. It focuses on empowering the teachers with the required skill by conducting comprehensive training with the motto *"Integral Education for all, by all"*.

To further the implementation of the project, SCERT has selected five schools as pilot schools in East Sikkim. Ms Ranju Pradhan, Faculty SCERT and two fellowship scholars – Mr Akash Pradhan and Mr Karan Kumar of SSSVV made an opening visit to the selected schools. The main objective of the visit was to orient the heads and the teachers about the framework of the programme. The second phase of the programme was the resource building workshop for SCERT and DIET (East), teachers of the pilot schools along with their heads. The workshop was conducted by SSSVV resource persons from Putaparti, Andhra Pradesh to orient them with the framework. The table below shows the programmes conducted-

State Coordination Meeting of NERIE

On behalf of NERIE, Umiam Meghalaya, SCERT- Sikkim organized a "State Coordination Committee meeting" at the Conference Hall of HRDD on 17th Nov 2016. The meeting was held to understand the educational need of the state. As per the need, programmes will be framed by NERIE for the state of Sikkim during next financial year. Dr Sima Saigal and Dr U. Sharma were present as representatives from NERIE. The meeting was chaired by Principal Secretary cum Additional Chief Secretary Shri G.P.Upadhyay and was also attended by Directors of various sections and other officials of HRDD. Principal DIET (East) with two faculty were also present in the meeting. Representation from SCERT included the Joint Director, Deputy Director and three faculty members.



Educational Quality Improvement Programme (EQUIP): Report of Activities conducted during 2016-17

EQUIP is an innovative initiative overseen by a Steering Committee that aims to transform schools in Sikkim through supporting the leaders in the schools, transforming pedagogy and creating a collaborative culture among relevant stakeholders who can make a difference in the system. The planning process of the program began in 2015-2016 and in 2017, the Pilot project is currently being implemented in the 8 EQUIP Schools. The ground work for the scale-up process of the program will begin after July 2017.

Group Learning Session 2 - Sharing of School Vision (26th April, 2016)

The second Group Learning Session after the Offsite Retreat in Delhi in 2016 was focused around sharing of the school vision and looking at the process that the schools are following in getting their stakeholders involved in building a school vision together. All principals and teacher facilitators of the 8 schools were a part of the session.

Workshop on School Standard Evaluation Framework (SCERT, 27th-30th April, 2016)

A workshop was held for the 8 schools by Azim Premji Foundation to introduce and study the School Standard Self Evaluation Framework (Shala Siddhi). The schools underwent a 4 day workshop to look deeply at the framework and study how they can use it as a tool to see where their school stands in the various domains.

School Visit (4th -7th May, 19th and 24th May, 2016)

The EQUIP team visited EQUIP schools to build awareness of the program, to gauge issues at the school level and to gain perspective on areas that require intervention through the program. The entire teacher community in each school was a part of these interactions.

Group Learning Session 3 – Vision Building Exercise (28th May, Jorethang Senior Secondary School,)

A workshop was held in Jorethang Senior Secondary School with all the teacher facilitators and principals of the 8 schools on how to build a vision for your school. The participants took part in learning the mechanics of building a vision and drawing a mission statement, along with building related objectives and goals.

School Visit – Deorali Girls Senior Secondary School (14th July, 2016)

Since it was not possible to cover Deorali Girls Senior Secondary School in the school visits in April, the team visited Deorali with a similar agenda to gauge the program in the school, to understand teacher's perspectives on everyday challenges and to build an understanding of areas of focus for program intervention.

Group Learning Session 4 Namchi Girls Senior Secondary School (23rd July, 2016)

A Group Learning Session was held in Namchi Girls Senior Secondary School with the Teacher Facilitators and Principals of the 8 schools to explore themes of what leadership means and what their understanding of school culture is. A part of the workshop also included training on the Literacy and Numeracy assessment tool used by Annual Status of Educational Report (ASER). The schools implemented the assessment in their schools thereafter.

Learning and Numeracy Survey

All students in classes 1-8 were surveyed as part of the census based assessment to test numeracy and literacy skills of the students in the EQUIP schools. The teachers of the schools itself conducted the survey and the results were analysed by SCERT.

Workshop on Contextualization of School Standard Evaluation Framework (SCERT, 1st -2nd Sep, 2016)

During this workshop held by Azim Premji Foundation, the principals and Teacher Facilitators of the schools revisited the SSEF and smaller core committee of teachers and principals took part in contextualizing the framework for Sikkim. A context for the implementation of the contextualized framework was also set.

Review and Renewal Workshop and Group Learning Session 5 Tadong Senior Secondary School (3rd -4th Sep, 2016)

A Review and Renewal Workshop was held in Tadong Senior Secondary School during which the goals, objectives and action plan for the next six months was set by each school. Some of the major goals that were chosen during the workshop were (a) work on building the motivation of the teacher community (b) achieve minimum level of learning in literacy and numeracy – Class 1 to 8 (c) do an outreach initiative to all relevant stakeholders.

Submission of 6-month School Action Plan (1st week of October, 2016)

An action plan was submitted by each school for the next 6 months to achieve the goals set in the Review and Renewal workshop in September.

First Executive Board Meeting of EQUIP (18th Oct, 2016)

During the first Executive Board Meeting of EQUIP, a convening was held at Tayakhim to discuss the project and to frame the Terms of Reference of the Board. The operation of the Program Management Unit which is the body that manages and implements the program was also articulated. Discussions were also held on the opening of the bank accounts of EQUIP.

3-Day Teach for India (TFI) Visit by Alumnus from the Network (Oct, 2016)

A 3 day visit was organized for 2 TFI Alumnus to Sikkim to study the context of Sikkim's schools and to plan out a strategy with the EQUIP team for potential paths of engagement. As part of their visit, the TFI alums visited the EQUIP schools and held focus groups with teachers and principals of the schools to understand context.

Finalization and Submission of Detailed Project Report (DPR) to the North Eastern Council (Oct, 2016)

The DPR for EQUIP was finalized and submitted to the North Eastern Council as an initiative to apply for the funding for the program.

School Visits to Understand the Context for Program Planning (7th -14th Nov, 2016)

The 8 EQUIP schools were visited by the Programme Management Unit (PMU) to understand (a) the principal's management system for their school (b) the training teachers get (c) the support expected by teachers (d) the culture of the classroom and staffroom (e) the system of professional development in school (f) what classroom transactions look like (g) how many extracurricular events take place (h) what the relationship with the BRCs and CRCs look like

Coordination Meeting with Partner Organizations in Delhi (18th Nov, 2016)

A coordination meeting held between Azim Premji Foundation, Createnet, Jodo Gyan and Teach for India Alums to align their modes of engagement for the purpose of EQUIP. A report on the progress thus far was shared and potential paths of engagement as planned by each organization was shared with the group.

Second Executive Board Meeting (21st Nov, 2016)

A second Executive Board Meeting was held in SCERT and a progress report was shared and an update was also given on the meeting held with collaborating partners in Delhi.

Discussing Evaluation with Azim Premji Foundation (16th Dec, 2016)

A two-member team from Azim Premji Foundation visited Sikkim to meet with the EQUIP team to discuss a plan for the impact evaluation of the EQUIP program. A decision was made to conduct a teacher study to assess the impact of the program on teachers as the first step of the baseline for the project.

Steering Committee Meeting (21st Dec, 2016)

The Steering Committee of EQUIP met for the first time in the HRDD Conference Hall on the 21st of December. At the Steering Committee, the DPR was presented along with the budget of the project. The committee was informed about the progress of the project and the findings from the visits to the schools on November 18th was also presented. As a result of the presentation on the burden of events from various organizations and departments on the schools, a decision was made to pass a notification to ensure that this burden is reduced.

Alignment Meeting with Partner Organizations, New Delhi (9th Jan, 2017)

EQUIP's three major focus areas of intervention, Leadership, Pedagogy and Culture, needed multiple partner organizations to be engaged with different stakeholders in the state's education eco-system. While there was a relatively clear idea on the area each partner organization – CreateNet, TFI and Jodo Gyan – would be working on, there was a strong need of discussion among the organizations to ensure there was no overlap and the interventions are complimenting each other producing the highest possible impact in the system. With the aim to achieve consistency in understanding and prepare an aligned road map for the year 2017, An alignment meeting was held in New Delhi on 9th Jan 2017. The meeting was chaired by Hon'ble MP Shri PD Rai. The representatives from three organizations along with EQUIP PMU team and the SCERT Director were among the participants. Each organization presented their plans of action and the target stakeholders for the year 2017 which were then discussed in detail to reduce overlaps. A consolidated year-long plan of activities was made at the end of the day. The meeting outcome was one of the major steps to initialize the process of intervention for the year 2017.

First Executive Board meeting of 2017 – 28th Jan, 2017

The first executive Board Meeting for the year was held on 28th of January at the EQUIP Office. During the meeting, Maj. General Vinod K Pillai was welcomed as the 9th member of the Executive Board. An overall presentation was also made which gave the vision behind EQUIP and the progress we have made thus far. Some of the issues that were flagged were data management in the system, closer regulation of what is happening in the schools, autonomy to the schools, and how we can identify the bright spots – teachers who are exceptional - in the schools. A discussion also took place on progress on conversations with CreateNet and Ashish

Dhawan on systemic Organizational Development. Questions like how do we change the mindset about how we think about education require answers.

A Leadership Development Workshop at Delhi (30th -3rd Feb, 2017)

The Principals, Teacher Facilitators and some members from the SCERT along with EQUIP PMU participated in the Leadership Development Workshop in Delhi during which the overall action plan for the year for the EQUIP schools was presented. During the course of the workshop, the principals and teachers reflected on some of their challenges and what actions they have taken on that. All members also reflected on what is learning and what the role of the teacher is in creating learning. The Shala Siddhi Assessment was also studied deeply and visits to innovative schools were done to observe the schools on the lines of the Shala Siddhi Framework and thus gain a deeper understanding of the



self-assessment. The group also met with Learning Managers or the TF equivalent from Delhi to share their successes, struggles and strategies with the group. Another outcome of the workshop was also an "Individual Self-Assessment" which all participants completed an online individual self-assessment which outlined each person's strengths, weaknesses, working style, etc. This provided a greater understanding of each other as teammates. A baseline and an endline was also done to gauge the impact of the workshop on the participants. Forward planning was also completed as next steps to implement in schools. The forward planning was to complete the Shala Siddhi assessment and for the Teacher Facilitators to create buy in amongst the teacher community. The workshop was held in Old and New Sikkim House, Delhi.

1st Jodo Gyan Training, Karfectar-South Sikkim (17-19 February, 2017)

EQUIP conducted its first large scale teacher training programme as part of its attempt of transforming the teaching and learning of Mathematics in Primary and Pre-primary classrooms. The three-day residential training was conducted by the founder of Jodo Gyan Usha Menon and EK Shaji, along with their colleagues Jazcinth and Pooja. Altogether 100 teachers and 12 State Resource Group members attended the training held at Karfectar, South Sikkim on 17-19 February, 2017. The first two days of the training focused on the introduction of the JodoGyan methodology. Teachers took part in interactive sessions involving teaching-learning materials and the concept of 'Rangometry' – a teaching practice developed by Jodo Gyan after years of

research. The third day of the training included a demonstration of the methodology for Resource Group Members at Jorethang Senior Secondary School.

Create Net Team's Visit to Sikkim (21st -28th February, 2017)

With an aim to better understand the context of Sikkim's education challenges and needs, and to know more about the operational aspects and classroom transaction processes of 8 EQUIP schools, two very experienced resource persons from CreateNet Education – Bidisha Roy and Madhuchhanda Rao, made their first visit to Sikkim on 21st February, 2017. During their weeklong visit, they travelled to 6 of the 8 EQUIP schools – Deorali Girls Government Senior Secondary School, Tadong Government Senior Secondary School, Namchi Girls Government Senior Secondary School, Jorethang Government Senior Secondary School, Soreng Government Senior Secondary School and Gyalshing Girls Government Senior Secondary Schools. They had conversations with the Principals and the teachers. They also visited some of the classrooms where they interacted with students. The school visits offered the CreateNet team the perspective on different challenges and opportunities ahead and the entire experience gave the team the required understanding to design their first monthly facilitation session with Principals and Teacher Facilitators from EQUIP schools.

Central Square Foundation (CSF) visit (1st -2nd Mar, 2017)

Ms Avantika Dhingra and Ms Shaveta Kukreja visited Sikkim in February and meet stakeholders in the education sector and outline a path of engagement with the state's education sector. They participated in meetings with the HRDD Directors and relevant officers, SCERT and DIET faculty, Principals and Teachers and the EQUIP team. They also met the Honourable Minister of Education Mr R.B. Subba as part of their visit. During their visit, they shared their work across the country and have made some proposals for potential paths of engagement with Sikkim in the future.

Second Executive Board Meeting (10 Mar, 2017)

The second Executive Board meeting of EQUIP was held on 10th March, 2017 at EQUIP Office, Tadong. The meeting was chaired by Director SCERT and the head of the Executive Board Dr Rabin Chhetri. The outcomes of the last Executive Board meeting and updates on the action points were presented by the EQUIP PMU Team. The outcomes from the visit by the CSF and their conversation with different stakeholders were discussed. Issues such as rebranding of the teaching profession, a need for reviving the data management system, the reconstructing process of SCERT, need for accountability and decentralization of education system in the state were discussed in detail and ideas around the same were shared. The next steps for EQUIP were identified and the two action items were recognized as priorities – restructuring of SCERT and working on Data Management System in Sikkim.

Jodo Gyan Training of Resource Persons for Baseline (10th-11th Mar, 2017)

A 12-member Resource Group was created to support the 8 schools in implementing the Jodo Gyan methodology in the schools. As part of the intervention, a baseline was also proposed and

for that purpose, the Resource Persons underwent a two-day baseline training at Deorali Girls Senior Secondary School and Tadong Senior Secondary Schools conducted by Ms Jazcinth from Jodo Gyan. The assessment tool for the baseline was contextualized by the EQUIP team and practice baseline assessments were done in the two schools.



1st facilitation session by Create Net (28th Mar, 2017)

CreateNet Facilitators conducted their first Monthly Facilitation Session on 28th March at Assam Lingzey Senior Secondary School. The day involved two parallel sessions – one by Bidisha Roy with the 8 EQUIP School Principals and another by Madhuchhanda Rao with the identified Teacher Facilitators (TF) from the 8 schools. The TFs are individuals who have been identified by the principals for their potential skill in developing other teachers. The participants went through sessions involving personality development activities (Johari Window, Tree of Life), understanding the role of TFs and articulating a vision for the group, reflecting on case studies of principals and TFs from other states and analyzing the Shaala Siddhi self assessment results for each school. The major outcomes of the program were sharing of ideas about how leaders in schools can bring change while doing little things effectively, realization of individual strength and the process of engaging with other stakeholders in school though personal connections, and the analysis of Shaala Siddhi domain results leading to prioritization of focus areas for each school.

SDG consultations – Education Administrators, Principals-Teachers, Youth

In order to build awareness and generate inputs to frame Sustainable Development Act of Sikkim, EQUIP team conducted three major consultations on Sustainable Development Goals. This was part of the ongoing consultations with various interest groups being coordinated by a core group under the office of Hon. Member of Parliament (Lok Sabha), Shri Prem Das Rai. The first of the consultations was held on 25th January with the educational administrators at HRDD Conference Hall; the second one, held at EQUIP office, Tadong on 11th February, involved the Principals and Teachers from few Senior Secondary Schools around Gangtok, Tadong; The third

one was conducted at Artem Magazine Office, Sichey on 7th March, with a group of youth represented by students from colleges and universities in and around Sikkim. The consultations were focused on Sustainable Development Goal 4 which talks about quality education. Different current issues such as the impact of no-detention policy on students, high drop-out rates, deployment of staff in schools, teachers' qualification, training and professional development, growing substance abuse among students, need to strengthen vocational courses were debated in detail. Inputs and suggestion were taken from the participants who came up with several policy and legislative recommendations which include inclusive infrastructure, strengthening of Integrated Child Development Scheme (ICDS), follow-up mechanism after teacher and students' training, strengthening of SMCs, curriculum changes to cater to 21st century skills, reform in recruitment process of teachers, introduction of learning benchmark in all classes. The outcome of the consultations will serve as the basis for the process of framing the legislation.

Baseline of Jodo Gyan (March 2017)

To assess the impact of the Jodo Gyan intervention, the members of the State Resource Group went to their designated EQUIP school and conducted a baseline study of the students. The sample for the study was students from LKG to Class 3 in the 8 EQUIP schools. About 730 students were assessed as part of the study. The assessment papers have been sent to Jodo Gyan and they will be analysing the outcome of the assessment at their Delhi Office.

Azim Premji Assessment Training (14th -16th Mar, 2017)

As part of EQUIP's plan to undertake an Impact Evaluation, a baseline will be conducted through a Teacher Study by the end of May 2017 which will form one of the aspects of an impact evaluation study. Alongside, an evaluation will also be done to study the transformation in leadership skills of Principals along with assessing the learning outcomes of the children at a later date.

To implement the Teacher Study in the 8 schools, a Teacher Assessment Framework developed

by Azim Premji Foundation was contextualised by the EQUIP team in Sikkim and a State Assessors Group of 14 members was also formed who would take ahead the study in the schools. Two resource persons from Azim Premji Conducted a two-day workshop with the State Assessors Group at SCERT which explored the Teacher Assessment Framework and studied the Classroom Observation Techniques and Interview process that would



be required by the assessors to complete with each teacher. Each assessor will be completing the study with each teacher in 3 days. A randomised sample of 100 teachers from Primary and Upper Primary sections in total has been chosen as the sample group for the study.

Azim Premji Pilot study (End of March – April)

As part of the Teacher Study, the assessors were given the task to study any teacher they chose and compile the observations in a document to be sent to Azim Premji Foundation for analysis. The pilot study has been completed and we are due to receive few more observation sheets from the assessors. The final Teacher Study will be conducted in May.

CHAPTER 8

SCHEME FOR INFRASTRUCTURE DEVELOPMENT IN MINORITY INSTITUTES (IDMI)

IDMI has been operationalised to augment Infrastructure in Private Aided/Unaided Minority Schools/Institutions in order to enhance quality of education to minority children.

The salient features of IDMI scheme are:

The scheme would facilitate education of minorities by augmenting and strengthening school infrastructure in Minority Institutions in order to expand facilities for formal education to children of minority communities.

The scheme will cover the entire country but, preference will be given to minority institutions (private aided/unaided schools) located in districts, blocks and towns having a minority population above 20%,

The scheme will inter alia encourage educational facilities for girls, children with special needs and those who are most deprived educationally amongst minorities.

The scheme will fund infrastructure development of private aided/unaided minority institutions to the extent of 75% and subject to a maximum of Rs. 50 lakhs per institution for strengthening of educational infrastructure and physical facilities in the existing school including additional classrooms, science / computer lab rooms, library rooms, toilets, drinking water facilities and hostel buildings for children especially for girls.

The state of Sikkim was also considered for IDMI grant from the year 2011-2012. The year wise release of grant by MHRD, so far, is as follows:-

CHAPTER 9 RUSA (Rashtriya Uchchatar Shiksha Abhiyan)

Introduction

The success of Sarva Shiksha Abhiyan (SSA) and Rashtriya Madhyamik Shiksha Abhiyan (RMSA) laid a strong foundation for primary and secondary education in India, which led to an increase in demand for higher education. However, the sphere of higher education had yet not witnessed any concerted effort for improvement of access or quality. Over the years, there has been an unprecedented expansion in number of institutions and volume of students in the country. To take advantage of the demographic dividend, there was a need for a concerted effort which would improve the quality and relevance of higher education and result in an educated and productive workforce.

The XII Plan (2012-17) argued for a holistic approach to higher education with renewed focus on improving the Quality of State institutions, together with addressing the issue of Access & Equity. A strategic shift was needed in several critical areas ranging from issues of access and equity to teaching-learning process, research, governance, funding and monitoring; which could connect funding streams to specific outcomes & desired impact. Planning Commission recommended strategic utilization of central funds to ensure comprehensive and optimum planning at the State level.

In lieu of above, a new overarching Centrally Sponsored Scheme for funding State Level Institutions was proposed called Rashtriya Ucchatar Shiksha Abhiyan (RUSA). It is an umbrella scheme to be operated in mission mode till March, 2020. ,which seeks to mainly improve overall quality of existing State higher educational institutions. The scheme is implemented through a set of bodies with clearly defined roles and functions at the National, State and Institutional Level.

Launched in 2013, the RUSA aims at providing strategic funding to eligible state higher educational institutions. The central funding (in the ratio of 60:40 for general category states, 90:10 for special category states and 100% for union territories) is based on norms and is outcome dependent.

Funds flow from the central ministry through the state governments/union territories to the State Higher Education Councils before reaching the identified institutions. Funding to states would be made on the basis of the critical appraisal of State Higher Education Plans, which would enlist each state's strategy to address issues of equity, access and excellence in higher education.

RUSA

The State of Sikkim joined RUSA on 10.07.2014 by committing to reforms in higher education in the State. The Project Approval Board (PAB) in its 8th, 9th and 10th PAB meetings held on 02.09.2015, 01.12.2015 and 02.02.2016 following components were approved:-

CHAPTER 10 TECHNICAL EDUCATION

The Directorate of Technical Education in the H.R.D. Department has been functioning ever since 1998 and there has been considerable activity in imparting technical education. The importance of modern technology and the advent of the computer age have resulted in the urgent need to equip our students with adequate knowledge and exposure in these areas. The industrial growth in the State will to a large extent depend on the existence of a base of skilled technicians. The State Govt. has taken the initiative to meet these challenges and this is reflected in high priority it has accorded to and its policy statements on Industry and Information Technology and Education.

The Directorate of Technical Education (DTE) is primarily charged at resent with the responsibility for overseeing the functioning of the two Polytechnics namely ATTC and CCCT established under the World Bank assisted Third Technician Education Project.

ATTC, BARDANG

Advanced Technical Training Centre (ATTC) is an autonomous polytechnic under the Directorate of Technical Education, Government of Sikkim. It was established in 1999 under the World Bank assisted "Third Technician Education Project" of the Government of India and is envisaged to be a model Institute with latest technologies and facilities to be set up as a "Centre of Excellence" in Sikkim. The establishment of this polytechnic is designed to address the need of employable skills in future technicians mainly for local industries in the state as well as the rest of the country.

The objectives of this polytechnic are to pursue a holistic approach in the development of skills, knowledge and attitudes in a systematic manner as well as to keep pace with the latest technological developments and to update the curriculum, manpower and infrastructure accordingly.

ATTC currently runs 6 AICTE approved three-year diploma courses, namely Diploma in Mechatronics (DM), Mechanical Engineering (DME), Tool & Die Making (DTDM), Manufacturing Technology (DMT), Computer Engineering (DCE) and Civil Engineering (DCVE) and has an intake capacity of 45 students per trade. ATTC is accredited with ISO 9000:2001 approval and the Diploma awarded is certified by the State Board of Technical Education, Government of Sikkim. ATTC has also started with a brand new course of Diploma in Civil Engineering which was approved by AICTE in the year 2016.

CCCT, CHISOPANI:

Centre for Computers and Communication Technology (CCCT), Chisopani, South Sikkim, a Government owned autonomous polytechnic established by the Government of Sikkim under the World Bank funded Third Technical Education (TechEd-III) project of MHRD at a cost of over 24 Cr. It is the premier polytechnic in the state of Sikkim providing Technical Education since 1999. Its establishment objective was to addressing the need to imbibe skill and employment oriented qualities for the unemployed youth in trades that are highly demanded in government, public and private sectors. It was setup as a 'Center of excellence' to provide quality education and training for students within the state, the nation and even neighboring countries. It offers Diploma Engineering courses which are approved by AICTE, Govt. of India since 1998 and is affiliated to *State Board of Technical Education (SBTE), Government of Sikkim*. It offers 3 year Diploma in:

- 1. Computer Science and Technology
- 2. Electrical and Electronics Engineering
- 3. Electronics and Communication Engineering
- 4. Civil Engineering

Under the NSQF format, CCCT is also a pilot Community College offering Level 3, 4 and 5 in:

- 1. Building Construction
- 2. Travel and Tourism (Adventure)

CCCT imparts employable skills to the youth. It has a holistic approach in skill, knowledge and attitude in all development in a systematic manner. It assesses the performance of trainees by continuous monitoring. It keeps pace with technological development and updates its curriculum, manpower and infrastructure suitably. CCCT ensures discipline, cleanliness and proper housekeeping.

CCCT is built away from the hustle bustle of the city where students can concentrate and exploit the facility for a serene environment for studies. It has modern classrooms, laboratories, latest equipment, Library with over 12000 books, national & international journals and periodicals, Broadband Internet through LAN and Wi-Fi, hostel for boys and girls, multi gym, playfields for sports and games, 24 hours security deployment and CCTV for monitoring. It provides sufficient housing for faculty who resides within the campus and provides continuous monitoring and guidance to students.

NEW UPCOMING POLYTECHNICS

Two new polytechnics are coming up at Mangshila, North Sikkim and Yangthang, West Sikkim to open up avenues for local students of the districts who are interested to pursue higher studies in technical field.

STATE BOARD OF TECHNICAL EDUCATION

The State Board of Technical Education was constituted vide notification no. GOS/DTE/2002/IV (II)/212 dated 24.8.2002.the function of SBTE i.e. to recognize/affiliate the Technical Institute situated within Sikkim. It is also responsible for conduct of examination and award of certificates for Technical Courses as per the prescribed standard laid down by AICTE.

A working cell of SBTE has been made functional in the Department of HRDD with appointment of a Registrar and a Controller of Exams.

ALLOTMENT OF STATE QUOTA SEATS

The Directorate of Technical Education has introduced the system of online application for allotment of State quota seats. Allotment of MBBS/BDS and Medical Allied seats is done on the basis of National Eligibility-cum-Entrance Test merit vis a vis reservation policy of the State Government. Likewise, allotment of Engineering seats are done on the basis of JEE (Mains) merit vis a vis reservation policy of the State Government. Other State Quota Seats are allotted on the basis of Merit of relevant qualifying examination i.e. (XII results). Horizontal reservation of 12% seats is also extended to BPL candidates.

CSAB.NEUT

The Directorate of Technical Education is associated with distribution of Central Pool B.Tech/B.Arch Seats to the bonafide students of Sikkim in collaboration with Central Seat Allocation Board (CSAB) MHRD, New Delhi. Officers of Technical Education participates in the meeting of CSAB from time to time at Delhi and NITs for central allocation of the Central Pool B.Tech/B.Arch seats as per the reservation policy of the State Government.

SMIT/SMIMS

The DTE also is administratively charged with dealing with matters relating to Sikkim Manipal University, and its constituent colleges, namely Sikkim Manipal Institute of Technology (SMIT) at Majhitar and Sikkim Manipal Institute of Medical Sciences (SMIMS).

SIKKIM INSTITUTE OF SCIENCE & TECHNOLOGY (SIST) CHISOPANI

The Government of Sikkim has already announced the opening of a Government engineering college at Chisopani, South Sikkim funded under Rashtriya Uttchatar Shiksha Abhiyan (RUSA) in the name and style of Sikkim Institute of Science and Technology which will be functional from the academic session 2018-19 and will cater to the studies of Civil and Computer Engineering. The foundation stone for the construction of new building was laid down on 5th July 2017 by the Hon'ble Chief Minister of Sikkim. The Engineering College will begin its first session from 2018-19, from the existing infrastructure at CCCT Chisopani.

CHAPTER 11 INFRASTRUCTURAL DEVELOPMENT (ENGINEERING CELL)

Background

The Principal objective of the State Government is to ensure maximum access to educational facilities to all the children in the State above the age of five years. Provision of quality education has always been a major concern of the Government. Education system in the State has witnessed an enormous expansion during the last 25 years to complement the new developing trends in the education sector.

For providing quality education the infrastructural development also play major role. Without providing the required infrastructures for Schools & colleges the quality education cannot be imparted.

Thus the Engineering Cell of H.R.D.D deal with monitoring and supervision works of construction, renovation, up-gradation and restoration works of various schools, colleges, gymnasium Hall & playground, toilets and hostels sanctioned under different Head of Accounts viz, NABARD, NEC, NLCPR, BADP, ACA, SPA, State Plan, CSS, Swacha Bharat & Swacha Vidhyalya, Mission, MSDP, TSP,SCSP,RUSA,RMSA,CIVIL DEPOSIT& NIQUIP funded AICTE.

During 2017-18, various works of school and college development have been carried out which were sanctionecd under various Head of Accounts as mentioned above. The detail showing the name of Schemes/works, date of commencement, date of completion, physical progress and financial progress with remarks under seperate Head of Accounts are indicated below:-

CHAPTER 15 SAAKSHAR BHARAT MISSION

The Saakshar Bharat Mission was launched in the State during the year 2010 in two districts of Sikkim i.e North and West. The main aim of the mission was to literate 19700 non literate as per the survey done by SLMA Sikkim.

Till 2016-17 most of the learners has completed the basic literacy and has been awarded with Grade Sheet of the Assessment Test issued by the NIOS.

The SLMA has transferred Rs. 25,00,000/- (Rupees Twenty five lakhs) only to North District for payment of Preraks and Coordinators. Likewise 43,43,000/- (Rupees Forty three lakhs forty three thousand) only has also been transferred to West District for payment of honorarium to Preraks and Coordinators of West District. The amount to the tune of Rs. 4,57,688/- has been spent for the honorarium to SLMA coordinator, Celebration of International Literacy Day and for meeting the tour expenditure of SLMA officials. During this year the following numbers of non-literate and had sited in the Assessment Test. The number of learners appeared in the assessment test are as follows:- March 2016= 564, August 2016= 689 and March 2017= 437. This has covered almost all the adult learners of North and West District.

A proposal for equivalency is in the pipeline and waiting for the guidelines of the National Literacy Mission from MHRD, New Delhi.
